



Order a breast pump at no extra cost

Your health plan has you covered

If you're planning to breastfeed once your baby arrives, having a breast pump on hand can give you peace of mind and help you feel prepared. Your health plan includes coverage for breast pumps and accessories so you can make sure you have what you need without worrying about the cost.

Your plan covers:

- The full cost of one standard manual or electric breast pump (not hospital-grade) per pregnancy, when purchased within 12 months of your baby's birth.
- Accessories used to operate your breast pump.
- A new set of breast pump supplies if you are planning to use a pump from a previous pregnancy. The supplies need to be purchased within 12 months of your baby's birth.

Where to buy or rent a breast pump

You can buy or rent breast pumps from a hospital, doctor, or durable medical equipment (DME) provider in your plan's network. To order a breast pump online, contact one of the DME providers below. They will verify your insurance coverage, provide free delivery, and bill your plan for your breast pump and supplies. You can also call them with questions about their products.

You can also search for local DME providers in your plan's network by calling Member Services at the number on your ID card.

Frequently asked questions

Can I buy a nonstandard (hospital-grade) breast pump?

Yes, but you will have to pay the additional cost.

What if my doctor prescribes a hospital-grade breast pump?

We understand that hospital-grade breast pumps may be needed in certain circumstances. They do require preapproval. Also, when prescribed, they are covered as rentals up to the purchase price.

Can I buy a breast pump from a retail store?

Retail stores such as Target, Walmart, and Amazon are not DME providers, so any purchases will not be covered by your plan.

My pharmacy sells breast pumps. Can I buy one there?

Breast pumps and supplies are not covered under your pharmacy benefit, so they won't be covered if they're bought from a pharmacy, even if the pharmacy is in your plan's network.



Prepare for pumping

Before you order, be sure to talk to your doctor or a lactation specialist about which breast pump would best fit your needs and lifestyle.
